## Open Call for Downtown Revitalization Project Proposals

The City of Rensselaer is excited to announce its intention to apply for funding through **Round 8 of the New York State Downtown Revitalization Initiative (DRI)**, which awards \$10 million, and/or the **NY Forward Program**, which awards \$4.5 million. Both programs are designed to support transformative projects that will create stronger, more vibrant downtowns across New York State.

As part of the application process, the City is seeking **project proposals from the community** that can help improve and expand our downtown. The proposed expanded downtown area includes sections of Columbia Street, Broadway, Herrick, East Street, and surrounding areas. Adjacent or nearby projects that would have a significant positive impact on the downtown district will also be considered.

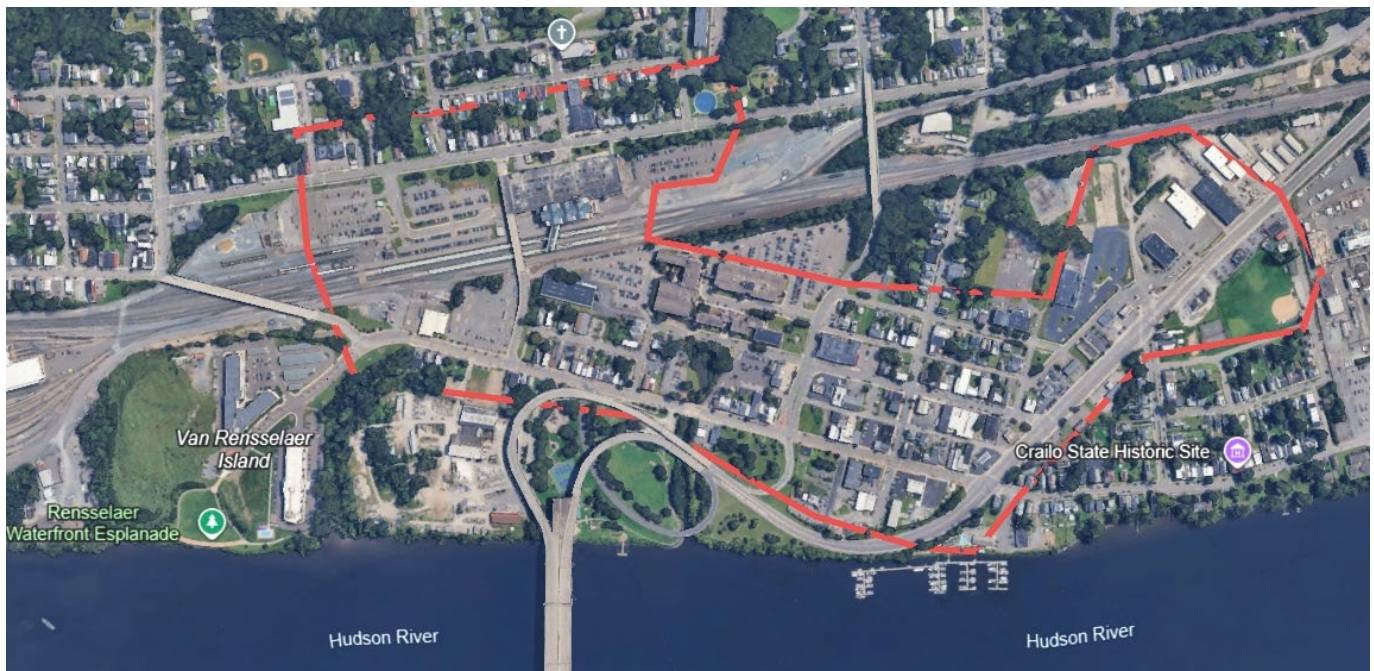
**Proposal Deadline:** September 18, 2025, by 3:00 PM

## *Community Comes Together to Support the Casey Frankoski Memorial Scholarship*



The community turned out in great numbers to support the **Casey Frankoski Memorial Scholarship** at a recent fundraiser held at the Olde Post Road Golf Club in Schodack.

The scholarship honors the memory of **Casey Frankoski**, a dedicated member of the New York National Guard from Rensselaer who tragically lost her life earlier this year in a helicopter crash while serving at the Texas–Mexico border. Also killed in the crash was **John Grassia of Schenectady County**.

Mayor Michael Stammel joined with John Grassia’s father John Sr, and many others at the event to celebrate Casey’s service and to help ensure her legacy continues through educational opportunities for local students.

The strong turnout was a testament to the deep respect and gratitude the community holds for Casey and her family, as well as a reflection of the collective commitment to honoring her as well as all who have made the ultimate sacrifice.

## **Rensselaer Farmers’ Market Awarded \$50,000 Grant**

The City of Rensselaer Farmers’ Market has been awarded a \$50,000 grant from the New York State Department of Agriculture and Markets. The funding will be used to enhance market infrastructure with decorative surface painting, new picnic tables and benches, and expanded promotion to encourage even greater participation from both farmers and residents.

The Rensselaer Farmers’ Market has grown into a lively community gathering each Thursday from 4:00 to 7:00 p.m. at Riverfront Park on Broadway and 4th Avenue. In addition to farm-fresh produce and a variety of local vendors, the market features live entertainment, free yoga classes, children’s arts and crafts, and a rotating schedule of special events. This summer has already included a popular Car Show and Foam Party, with more family-friendly activities ahead: a Health and Wellness Fair (September 18), a Petting Zoo (September 25), a Chili Cook-Off (October 2), and Touch the Truck (October 16).

Mayor Michael Stammel praised the teamwork behind the market’s success:

“The Farmers’ Market is a great asset for our community. I commend the City Clerk’s Office for coordinating this activity for our residents and the Planning Department for obtaining this grant to help make the Farmers’ Market even better.”

City Clerk Nancy Hardt, whose office organizes the market and its events, added:

“Our Farmers’ Market keeps getting better and better, and this grant will certainly help with our efforts.”

Planning Director Thomas Hulihan also recognized the value of the funding:

“The City of Rensselaer Planning Department is always exploring opportunities that can improve our city. We are very grateful to the New York State Department of Agriculture and Markets for providing us with this grant to improve our Farmers’ Market.”

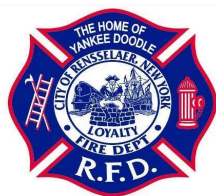

## ***Fall Bulk Pick-up Schedule Begins with Monday, September 8th***

The City of Rensselaer Department of Public Works will begin its annual **Fall Bulk Pick-Ups** starting **Monday, September 8, 2025**. This service provides residents with the opportunity to dispose of large household items that cannot be placed out for regular trash collection.

Bulk pick-ups will take place according to residents' **regular trash collection days**:

- **Tuesday Trash Route** – Bulk Pick-Up on **Monday, September 8**
- **Wednesday Trash Route** – Bulk Pick-Up on **Monday, September 15**
- **Thursday Trash Route** – Bulk Pick-Up on **Monday, September 22**
- **Friday Trash Route** – Bulk Pick-Up on **Monday, September 29**

Residents are asked to place bulk items neatly at the curb **the evening before their scheduled pick-up day**. Please note that regular trash and recycling collection will continue as usual.

## **Important Notice: Pump Station Rehab Fees Coming to an End**

For the past two years, residents and property owners in the City of Rensselaer have been paying a temporary water bill fee to help cover the City's share of the multimillion-dollar project to rebuild and modernize the jointly owned water pump station with the Town of East Greenbush.

That project is now complete, and with it, the additional charge for **Pump Station Rehabilitation** on your water bills will officially come to an end.

This fee was first introduced as the most equitable way to fund Rensselaer's portion of the costs to replace pumps, motors, and drives that had been in continuous use since 1964. The outdated equipment had been rebuilt countless times, and service parts were no longer available, creating risks for both water reliability and future growth. Thanks to the contributions of all city property owners, the City was able to meet its obligations and secure a safe, uninterrupted water supply for years to come.

As a reminder, the fee had amounted to \$3.66 per 1,000 gallons of water used and was visible on water bills under a separate line item. For many minimum-use households, this added approximately \$46.11 to each semi-annual bill.

With the project now paid in full, that line item will no longer appear on your upcoming bills.

On behalf of the City, thank you to our residents and businesses for your patience and understanding as we worked together to ensure this critical infrastructure improvement was completed.

## *City of Rensselaer Honors Bryan Leahey with Proclamation*

At the Common Council meeting on Wednesday, August 20, 2025, Mayor Mike Stammel presented a formal proclamation to longtime resident and community leader **Bryan Leahey**, recognizing his decades of service, volunteerism, and civic leadership.

Leahey, a proud alumnus of Rensselaer High School's Class of 1974, devoted more than 30 years as a City Letter Carrier for the United States Postal Service. Beyond his career, he became a cornerstone of the community, dedicating over two decades to youth sports and organizations—including Pop Warner Football, Little League, the Gerald O'Neil American Legion baseball team, and Rensselaer High School football.

The proclamation also highlighted his role in preserving local baseball history by commemorating Roger Connor of the Troy Trojans, who hit the first recorded grand slam in 1881 at what is now Riverfront Park. His efforts helped secure both media recognition and a permanent monument to the achievement.

Throughout the years, Leahey has been honored with numerous awards, including the Rensselaer Award and the RJ Manning Award for Service and Dedication to Youth. He also served more than ten years on the Rensselaer Housing Authority Board of Commissioners, five as chairperson, and was appointed Third Ward Alderman in 2019.

In presenting the proclamation, Mayor Stammel praised Leahey's "lifelong dedication, selfless service, and lasting impact on the Rensselaer community."

## Vacant Rental Property Program

The City of Rensselaer is preparing to apply for funding from New York State to support a Vacant Rental Property Program — and we need your participation!

If awarded, this grant would allow the City to assist property owners in rehabilitating vacant housing units and converting unusable spaces, such as former commercial areas, into safe, high-quality, and affordable rental housing.

Eligible repairs may include:

- Health & safety improvements
- Code violation corrections
- Accessibility upgrades
- Environmental remediation
- General residential updates

Potential Grant Assistance:

Up to \$50,000 per unit if you agree to rent to households at or below 80% Area Median Income (AMI) for 10 years.

Up to \$75,000 per unit if you agree to rent to households at or below 60% AMI for 10 years.

This is a valuable opportunity to bring Rensselaer's vacant properties back to life—creating affordable housing and stronger neighborhoods.

## City Offers Economic Development Loans for Local Business

The City of Rensselaer is now accepting applications for its **Economic Development Loan Program**, a HUD-funded initiative designed to support business growth and job creation within the city.

This revolving loan fund is available to both new and existing businesses — including manufacturers, wholesalers, retailers with three or more employees, and eligible service-based businesses.

### Program Highlights:

- **Loan amounts** range from **\$30,000 to \$150,000**
- **Fixed interest rate** based on the *lowest Wall Street Journal Prime Rate* at time of closing
- Loan may fund up to **40% of the total project cost**
- **Job creation requirement:** One job created within 2 years for every \$10,000 borrowed (at least 51% of jobs must benefit low-to-moderate income households)

**Fees:** \$25 pre-application, \$150 full application, and 1% commitment fee due before closing

### Loan funds can be used for:

- Acquiring fixed assets
- Purchasing inventory
- Supporting current accounts receivable

Refinancing existing debt (if required as part of the total project financing)

Please note: loan proceeds **cannot** be used for capital improvements.

## Fall Property Maintenance: Keeping Rensselaer Beautiful Year-Round

### Tips for Fall Property Care:

- **Rake and remove fallen leaves** from yards, sidewalks, and curb lines to prevent buildup and slippery conditions.
- **Clear gutters and drains** to avoid ice dams and water damage during winter storms.
- **Trim trees and shrubs** to reduce the risk of broken branches and damage from snow and ice.
- **Dispose of yard waste and clutter properly**, keeping walkways, porches, and driveways safe and accessible.
- **Secure outdoor items** such as lawn furniture, grills, and decorations to prevent damage or hazards in high winds.

Neglected properties don't just affect one home—they impact the whole block, lowering property values and creating safety concerns. The City of Rensselaer has ordinances in place to ensure all properties are properly maintained throughout the year. Failure to comply may result in fines or enforcement action.

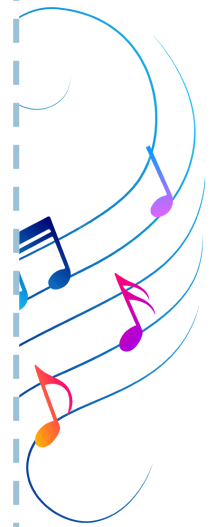
## Rensselaer Seniors Spotlight
